

AN EXPANDED AND GENEROUS TABLE: IS HYBRID WORSHIP IN YOUR FUTURE?

There are no silver linings from the COVID19 Pandemic. Too many people have died, too many people are now struggling with day-to-day survival, and too many people's futures have been left in turmoil and doubt. This season in the life of humanity has been simply put, awful.

At the same time, during this time, churches have stepped into spaces that many would have never imagined they could. Congregations have answered the call to fight for social justice and institutional accountability; they have given resources of time, space, and prayer; and they have served, fed, and clothed those in need. In a time when all of our actions have been magnified through the lens of the pandemic, many churches have adapted in amazing and faithful ways.

This shift may not be more evident in any other area than worship. Communities have adapted to online spaces for worship, meetings, pastoral care, conferences, and more. It has not always been easy and not everyone thrives in this setting, but congregations have, across denominations, risen to the challenge in diverse and creative ways.

While there is no single, best way for people to gather for worship, as the proverbial light at the end of the tunnel begins to shine and the conversation about "going back" begins in earnest, the question for many congregations is this, "Once online worship is no longer the only option for you and your congregation, will you all have the willingness, energy, and capacity to birth, curate, nurture, and sustain a long-term digital space?" or more succinctly put, "What now?"

The decisions that are made about worship in the coming months must not be taken lightly but must be approached with communal discernment, reflective honesty, and faithful practicality. For those with inklings and dreams about hybrid worship, it is my hope that the questions I offer will help you and your leadership to understand different options, assess congregational willingness, energy, and capacity, and make faithful choices that will best equip you for the future.

Assumptions made by Bruce...

- "Church" is more than worship, but worship is still central to most congregations.
- Context matters and every leader must assess and translate for their particular spaces.
- How congregations meet for committee meetings and other small gatherings will be forever changed, but the desire for worship to return to "what it was before" is strong.
- "Hybrid Worship" requires much more energy and resources than many congregations have, so there may be more effective options than hybrid worship for these congregations.
- Worship is not a competition, numbers are only a measurement, and engagement will be evaluated differently in every space.

Hybrid	In-person or remote, a service where people have essentially the same worship experience.	"We are all still around the same table!"	"Whoa, this is a ton of work." <p style="text-align: center;">REIMAGINE</p> <p>Resist simple replicating what has always been done: ritual, proclamation, children, music, guests, etc.</p>				
<p style="text-align: center;">DECENTER</p> <p>In language, content, and structure resist making geographic proximity the ideal experience of worship.</p>				



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<p>INVITE Invite remote participants into leadership in order for systems to be changed by those who it benefits.</p>				
<p>ASSESS Evaluating the willingness, energy, and expertise of staff and volunteers. Adjust and add as needed.</p>				
<p>ENGAGE Create a community where remote folks will be missed if they are no longer able to regularly participate.</p>
